Water Restrictions Coming Very Soon...

As I type this (1 December 2019) the Mangrove Creek Dam level is at 53.6%.

When this dam reaches 50% full, residents will be subject to Level 1 Water Restrictions.

The restrictions apply to outdoor use of town water and include rainwater tanks that are topped-up with town water.

The use of standalone rainwater/bore water and/or recycled water is not restricted but must be identified by signage at the location of water use.

Under Level 1 Water Restrictions you can:

- Water gardens and lawns with hand held hoses fitted with a trigger nozzle or drip irrigation systems:
 - ◆ Any day of the week.
 - ◆ Before 10am and after 4pm to avoid the heat of the day.
 - ◆ Use a watering can at any time on any day.
- Wash cars and boats with a bucket or hose fitted with a trigger nozzle or pressure cleaner.
- Flush boat motors with a hose fitted with a trigger nozzle.
- Wash external building surfaces, including windows, retaining walls, structures (eg. pergolas) and outdoor furniture, provided a trigger nozzle hose or pressure cleaner is used. Hosing of paths and driveways is not permitted.
- Fill up new pools using the town water supply
- Top up existing pools using the town water supply

Level 2 Restrictions start at the 40% level of the Mangrove Creek Dam.

Summer is coming...



Your Sewer System Might Flood/ Breakdown!!! Know Your Island Vacuum Sewerage System

The Council operates a vacuum sewerage systems on St Huberts Island to move your sewage to the pump station at the "Pump Park" building.

When sewage from the pair of homes that share each valve pit/chamber begins to fill this pit, the sewage is "sucked" through the vacuum main and into the collection tank at the Pump Park building. The collected sewage is then pumped under Brisbane Water into gravity mains and on to the treatment plant at Kincumber.

BUT... this type of system requires a fair amount of monitoring, supervision and maintenance to ensure your vacuum pit empties when required.

After talking to one of these maintenance men I discovered:

- * call-outs are frequent on the Island
- * significant improvements have been made recently and call-outs reduced.
- * call-outs are creeping back up again as the Island population increases and changes. Originally houses were two/three bed in size with elderly couples and is changing to young families in four/five bedders with an active pool. The system is receiving more input, particularly the emptying of swimming pools into the system, causing significant overload/call-outs/maintenance of the system.
- * there are considerable issues during the SUMMER/CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS. An increase in holiday rentals, and the increase in family and visitor numbers increases the demands on our system.
- * other than "overuse" the main call-out is one of BLOCKAGES IN THE VACUUM CHAMBER. Items such as baby wipes, tampons, toilet-bowl deodorisers, prawn heads and even fish heads end up creating blockages in the valve pit that need a callout. Excess fats from sinks also create issues as they build up around the seals in the pit.

If your vacuum pit malfunctions you need to call Council ASAP.

Once you've found your pit, it is having problems if -

- ◆ there is a leak around the concrete lid.
Something has stopped the valve from opening - the pits are pretty deep so the chamber is very full!
- ◆ you hear a whooshing or constant pump sounds coming from the pit.
Something has jammed the valve open so the pit thinks there is sewage in there to be sucked away.
- ◆ you look in your toilet bowl and there is no water in it... and probably a whooshing noise as well.
It's the same jammed-open valve issue (above) but the pit lid fits so well, the vacuum system is sucking sewage from all your house sewer pipes - including toilet and sink odour traps - and it may smell!

The "take-aways" from this article are -

Do

- ❖ Ensure clear access to the vacuum chamber at all times and ensure there is adequate clearance around the vacuum chamber to remove the lid and allow work on the chamber.
- ❖ Call Council if sewage is leaking from the vacuum chamber.
- ❖ Call Council if you hear the sound of rushing air at the vent to the vacuum chamber.

Don't

- ❖ Use toilet deodorisers which hang on the inside of the toilet bowl - they frequently become dislodged and end up clogging your vacuum chamber - it is preferred that you use the type which hangs within the cistern.
- ❖ Put tampons, sanitary pads or similar bulky items down the toilet. They clog up your vacuum chamber. Dispose of them in the rubbish bin.
- ❖ Park cars over the vacuum chamber.
- ❖ Erect gardens, rockeries, paths, driveways or other structures over the vacuum chamber.
- ❖ Place anything on the vacuum chamber lid.
- ❖ Pour fatty substances down the sink as the fat collects in the vacuum chamber and clogs it up.

Midgies and Sandflies on St Huberts

[... they are the same beastie.]

The biting midges that have decided to make St Huberts Island their home are commonly called sandflies in Australia and “no-see-ums” in North America.

They are very small - 1 to 3 mm long - and are found everywhere in the world except the Antarctic and Arctic.

While males and females feed on nectar, egg-laying females need protein so feed on our blood. As we all know, bites are painful and form very itchy lesions. Unfortunately for us their mouth-parts are perfect for cutting into our skin.



The biting activity of adult biting midges is mainly limited to the periods of dawn and dusk; they will remain inactive through very windy weather, finding shelter amongst vegetation. Biting midges will usually disperse only short distances from their breeding sites.

Itching may commence immediately after the bite, but often not for some hours later, and most individuals are unaware of being bitten at the time.

Biting midges have their greatest impact on people arriving to an area or tourists. Local residents seem to build up some immunity to the biting. In some sensitive people, midges can produce persistent reactions that blister and weep serum from the site of each bite and these reactions may last for several days to weeks. Biting midges are not known to transmit any disease-causing pathogens to humans in Australia.

Treatment and Control

The University of Sydney tells us there are no known efficient methods of controlling biting midges, but personal protection will help in reducing exposure to their bites. They say avoid localities, especially at dawn and dusk, that are known to be frequented by biting midges; wear protective clothing (long sleeves/pants), and apply a repellent to exposed skin. These measures will assist in limiting exposure to these biting flies. Irritation associated with bites may be alleviated with anti-pruritic preparations such as EURAX, but severe reactions may require medical treatment with antihistamines.

Climate Change Action Plan Community Working Group The President's 1st Report

Rod's - and the other appointee's - role is to act as an advocate on behalf of the local community for the Council's Climate Change Action Plan and provide assistance and advice in the development of the "Community Engagement Program".]



As you know, we were very vocal in responding to Council with regard to the Climate Change Action Plan (CCAP) that they basically snuck up on us with. We did in fact make a presentation to the Councillors regarding our opposition to particularly the Planned Retreat side of the policy and fortunately this has been taken off the page at this stage.

Following up from this I decided that I would put my name forward to try and involve myself in the CCAP committee that they were looking at creating and have been successful in attending those meetings.

These are regarding the Climate Policy that has now been adopted by Council. So it's not an opposition to, it's a means of, planning how they're going to release and involve more of the community with their Action Plans. We are trying to get all these minutes up on our website, so as soon as we have some information as to whether that's possible and how we can do it, we will respond to everybody via emails and on the Facebook page.

I'm there as an observer and putting our two cents worth in.

So stay tuned and we'll look to try and keep it as reasonable as possible.

Ken's Roasted Razor Clams

Razor clams have certainly been in the headlines lately.

One way to get rid of these dangerous clams is to eat them.

They taste really good if prepared the right way - roasted with red chilli, garlic and rosemary.

Ingredients:

- ◆ 1 kg razor clams
- ◆ 2 red chillies
- ◆ 3 cloves garlic
- ◆ 3 sprigs fresh rosemary
- ◆ olive oil
- ◆ ½ lemon

Method:

1. Leave clams in a bucket of water for a few hours to get rid of any sand inside the clam.
Don't eat the little black bit inside which is the clam's stomach - it will be a bit gritty!
2. Preheat oven to its maximum.
3. Rinse your clams under cold running water and pull off any seaweed. Make sure the shells are all tightly closed. Spread out in a roasting tray.
4. Slice the chillies and unpeeled garlic lengthways, then scatter over the clams. Spread over the rosemary leaves, then drizzle everything with olive oil and put in the oven.
5. Roast for 5 to 6 minutes, or until the shells start to open.
6. Turn the tray around to make sure the clams cook evenly, then return to the oven until all the clams are open.
7. Remove them from the oven and squeeze over the juice from the half a lemon. Using tongs, lift the clams onto a serving dish and spoon any tray juices over the top.
8. Drizzle with extra virgin olive oil and serve with crusty bread.

The meal goes down well
with a bottle of sauvignon
blanc (or Moet!)

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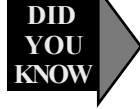

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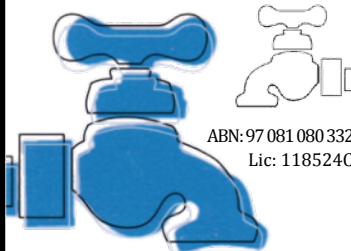


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Scoop That Poop

Zoysia Grass

A random conversation the "other day" led to the type of grass the Islanders are using in their yards.

While many praised Sir Walter buffalo grass, **Zoysia Grass** was lauded by one resident who commented it was far better than Sir Walter.

So what is it?

Zoysia is a genus of creeping grasses widespread across much of Asia and Australia, as well as various islands in the Pacific. Of the three sub-genus' of Zoysia, 'Zoysia matrella' - sold under many names including Sir Grange (cultivar Zoysia 'Zeon') and Shadetuff - appears to be the most versatile and robust for the St Huberts Island climate.

Originally used on golf courses, considerable research and development has made it perfect for home lawns and commercial use.

Compared to others, Zoysias, matrella has -

- ❖ a very fine leaf and soft feel
- ❖ a very high shade tolerance
- ❖ very high drought resistance
- ❖ very high wear tolerance
- ❖ tolerance to a wide temperature range

and

- * requires less mowing
- * requires less fertiliser
- * requires less water
- * a higher density
- * excellent at repelling weeds.

Another popular cultivar - Zoysia 'Emerald' - seems to be suited to warmer regions than St Huberts.

So if your current grass is struggling with our changing climate, maybe we need to do some research and check out the various Zoysia Grasses.

Do you have halogen down-lights at home??

One Island resident recently had 100 down lights changed for \$49!

Halogen globes, while incredible bright, chew through electricity and generate a lot of heat. LED globes are the opposite - so much so that the NSW Government has launched a lighting upgrade offer for households.

The purpose of the offer is to help eligible households replace old lights with new LED lights. The cost of the LED lights and the fee for installation is subsidised. Currently, the offer targets the replacement of halogen down-lights with LED down-lights.

Summer Old4New Lifejacket Program

For the last five seasons the State Government has provided a subsidised Old4New lifejacket program at boattramps and boatshows encouraging all boaters/sailors to upgrade their lifejackets to modern versions.



And each year the government is very slow in announcing another season of this very successful

program - this year is no different.

The team is reviewing the program and will be considering what approach to take in coming seasons. Meanwhile, people can contact one of the BIA Retail Partners for advice on modern lifejackets." Razor Clams rearing their (ugly) heads again!!

Razor Clams are always with us, buried in the canal sands we walk and play on - particularly during the Summer Holidays. It seems that The Island News warns residents (and visitors) of the presence and danger of these razor-sharp, buried, foot-slashing beasts every two years. There have been newsletter articles in the December 2015 and September 2017 editions (at sthubertsisland.nsw.au/island-news/island-news-archive/).

It's 2019, so time again... Razor clams are dangerous to feet - these fan shaped clams grow up to 50 cm or more in length, and bury themselves



vertically in seagrass sediment and sand, leaving thin sharp protruding shell-lips and boaties. As a living clam they place themselves in the seagrass areas then continue to grow larger for up to 18 years. After the clam dies, the vertical dangerous shell remains and continues to create havoc to bare feet.

So be aware and on the lookout.

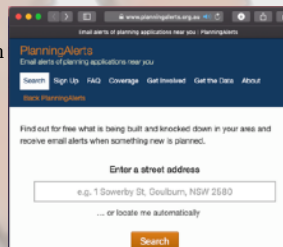
