A very disturbing incident occurred on the Island with a vicious dog attack by an unsecured dog on another dog being walked on a lead. Whilst we all think that our pooches are super friendly and can roam free on our streets, at the end of the day they are still animals that are very territorial and can attack without notice. If this had been a small child that was attacked we hate to think of the consequences and the ongoing physical and mental damage that could have been done.

As it happened, the cost of vet bills was significant let alone the hurt and suffering for the owner and the innocent dog. Many of us live on properties that are not fully fenced and it is the dog owner's responsibility to control their pets and keep them off other resident's property, and walk them on leads regardless as to how cute you think your dog is. Many younger children that do not have pets can be terrified of your dog and that is why dogs are not allowed near playground areas. Council has a Responsible Dog Ownership Fact Sheet which can be found on the CCC website. Barking dogs are also a nuisance and complaint forms can be found on CCC website. Council Rangers can be contacted on 4325 8222 if you see dogs roaming our street not on leashes.

As we go to print we are very close to finalising the new licensing agreement with CCC for the Pontoons and Walkways. At worst case scenario we have secured a 15 year licence which is a major improvement on the initial 5 years we were offered. Details will be published on our website as soon as they are finalised.

Also the Plan of Management (POM) for the canals is in its final stages with the different stakeholders at Council reviewing the consultant's brief before handing it over to us. Stay tuned!!!

If you prefer **internet** to phone, you can access www.police.nsw.gov.au, click on to the NSW Police Force Community Portal and complete a non-emergency Online Police Reports form. The report will be passed on to police in the same way as phone reports to the Police Assistance Line.

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IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Medical Alarms & Security Systems on the NBN

On St Huberts our NBN is Fibre-to-the-Node (FTTN) and it uses part of the copper telephone network.

Because of this FTTN system, the NBN "takes over" your copper telephone line and you lose the use of your traditional phone service and any other equipment that used your phone lines.

AND... it is NBN policy that the entire copper telephone network is disconnected around 18 months after the NBN becomes available. By my calculations the NBN arrived on St Huberts at the end of February 2016, which means there will be no more traditional copper telephone lines on the Island after (my guess) August 2017.

So you need to do something about your security systems and medical alarms that currently rely on a landline telephone.

Most security systems and medical alarms were largely dependent on the phone line whether you actually used it to make phone calls or not.

Australian security and medical alarm providers have long since begun altering their products to be less reliant on landlines. While they can run over the NBN, they are vulnerable during power outages so it's vital to have a backup solution in place to ensure that your system stays alert. Wireless and mobile technologies are now being used for this – not only are they less susceptible to physical tampering (i.e. there's no line to cut) some models may even be able to be connected to a backup power source.

You must reach out to your security or medical alarm provider.

Not all alarm equipment is compatible with the NBN. If your home or business has a monitored alarm or another kind of security system installed, you should contact your provider before making the switch to NBN to make sure that everything will work as expected.

Here's some questions you should ask when discussing your options:

Will my alarm work properly when I connect to the NBN?
Once I'm on the NBN, will my alarm be able to dial out during a power outage?
Will my alarm have an alternate communication path in case the primary method fails?
Will my alarm "check in" periodically to make sure the communication path is still
working?
If a mobile service is involved, do I need to arrange my own mobile service or is that
included with the security product?
Will I need a service call or any new equipment when changing to the NBN?

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Dogs on St Huberts

An investigation of the previous editions of The Island News and minutes of General and Committee meetings of the Island's Residents Association since 1976, has demonstrated a continual problem with roaming dogs, dogs off leash and dog poo - and probably started when the Island bridge connected the Island to the mainland in 1971.

A recent occurrence early this year shows it is now time... AGAIN... to cover dog owner's legal responsibilities.

Your dog must be under the effective control of a competent person at all times when out in public. This means that it must be on a leash and under the control of someone capable of restraining it. A small child, for example, may not be able to control a

large dog. Under these circumstances, an adult capable of restraining the dog should walk the dog.

A dog is not considered to be under the effective control of a competent person if the person has more than 4 dogs under their control. If you fail to comply with this requirement, you, or if you are not present, the person in control of your dog, if they are aged 16 or over, may be liable for a maximum penalty of \$1,100 or \$11,000 in the case of a restricted dog, dangerous or menacing dog.

This requirement does not apply to a dog -

- in an off-leash area (but only if the total number of dogs of which its owner has control does not exceed 4.
- a dog secured in a cage or vehicle or tethered to a fixed object or structure
- a dog being exhibited for show purposes
- a dog participating in an obedience class, trial or exhibition
- a dog engaged in droving, tending or working of stock
 - a police dog or a corrective services dog

All fishers should have these two apps on their smart devices.

DPI - Department of Primary Industries

The new DPI's app is *FishSmart*.

It can be found in the Apple's App Store at https://itunes.apple.com/au/app/fishsmart-nsw-nsw-fishing/id1092320415?mt=8 and Android's Google Play at https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=com.mobiddiction.fishsmart&hl=en.




The app provides recreational fishers 24/7 access to essential information they need to know to fish in NSW.

The app includes; bag and size limits, closed seasons and fishing gear

It provides a real-time map to locate your nearest FADs, artificial reefs, Recreational Fishing Havens and show where Marine Park zones are. It also includes guides on; spearfishing, fishing safely, trout fishing, regional fishing information and more.

Use the app to contact DPI for reporting illegal fishing, fish kills, pest species etc as well as to contact local Fisheries Offices.

You can view the DPI's Facebook newsfeed and pay your recreational fishing licence fee using the app.



Marine Rescue NSW

This app is the *MarineRescue* App.

Download it from Apple's App Store at https://itunes.apple.com/au/app/marine-rescue-nsw/id722023675?mt=8 or Android's Google Play at https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=com.marinerescuensw&hl=en.

It is the only app that connects you directly to Marine Rescue NSW, allowing you to log-on and log-off, and for Marine Rescue to look out for your safety.

The app offers -



a live safety tracking option, automatically updating your position every 30 minutes so Marine Rescue can track your journey



local tide, weather and sea conditions your latitude/longitude position coordinates boat ramp locations and popular fishing spots a safety checklist for before you head out emergency call procedures information on Marine Rescue NSW.



UAVs - Unmanned Aerial Vehicles RPAs - Remotely Piloted Aircraft

Use of Drones in Australia Has Now Been Formalised

Rules for flying drones in Australia came in to effect on 29 September 2016. These rules are found in Part 101 of the Australian Civil Aviation Safety Regulations, with the use of drones controlled by CASA - the Civil Aviation Safety Authority. These rules came about to manage the ever-growing stupid uses and activities of "drone pilots".



Whatever your reasons for flying them, it is an offence to operate an unmanned aircraft in a way that creates a hazard to another aircraft, another person or property - and this includes on St Huberts Island!!

The standard RPA operating conditions are as follows: [Editor Bolding]

- You must only fly during the day and keep your RPA within visual line-of sight.
- You must keep your RPA at least 30 metres away from other people.
- You must not fly your RPA over any populous areas.
 These can include: beaches, parks and sporting ovals.
- You must not fly your RPA over or near an area affecting public safety or where emergency operations are underway (without prior approval).

This could include situations such as a car crash, police operations, a fire and associated firefighting efforts, and search and rescue.

- You must not fly your RPA higher than 120 metres (400ft) AGL [above ground level].
- You must keep your RPA at least 5.5km away from controlled aerodromes.
- You can only fly one RPA at a time.

If you wish to fly outside any of these conditions, you need to be licensed and/or certified by CASA.
