

Edwards Family Butchers

We hear from Marc Edwards, owner of Edwards Family Butchery (together with JoAnn):

I started my butchering career in 1977 in our family butcher shop at Round Corner in Dural.

From there I bought a shop in Terrey Hills where I worked for three years, then had a break from butchering and went into Real Estate. I returned to butchering in Airlie Beach at Cannonvale in 1996, buying my father's shop as he decided to retire. It was here that JoAnn and I got married. We sold the shop and left the Whitsundays in 2000 after having a six month caravan trip around Australia with Max who was only 13 months old. We returned to Sydney and bought a butcher shop in Wahroonga and this was the time that our youngest son, Luke, was born 2001.

Over the next eight years we bought, built up and sold four shops - sometimes having two shops at one time. We sold Wahroonga, Westleigh, Dural and then our shop in Beecroft. In 2009 we purchased our Woy Woy shop and bought a house on St Hubert's Island in January 2010, just in time to get our boys into primary school - year 6 and year 3. We currently still have our "mother" shop in Woy Woy and a new butcher shop in East Gosford. We also have both our boys as apprentices in our shops... continuing our **family tradition**, **now in its fourth generation**.

Ronald Gordon Spratt OAM

2 February 1938 - 20 September 2017

"Ron came to St Huberts Island some 25 years ago and for 16 of those years he spent as Chairman of the Island Association. He oversaw a number of projects on the Island and was the main conduit between the Committee and Council. This was due to the large amount of contacts he had having worked for many years at Ashfield Council in Sydney. He started as a plumber and latter moved to the Council.

Ron spent a number of years as Presidents of the NSW and Australian Environment Health Association, as well as the President of International Federation of Environmental Health (1988 - 1991). He and Fay organised and represented Australia at many of their conferences both here and at locations around the world.

Ron loved to entertain and would go to as many parties as he could - I think he just loved to be around people. He was a mad-keen supporter of the Balmain Tigers.

Ron had been a boaty for a time when

he first moved to the Island and owned 2 boats over that period but decided age had got the better of him and gave it away.

He had three children, David, Craig and Leanne as well as five grandchildren and three son/daughters in law.

Ron was an active member of the Liberal party.

He was particularly pleased and proud of his Medal of the Order of Australia that he received on 26 January 2000 for "service to community health, through the environmental health and waste management industries."

What better summer-time salad than this tried and tested recipe from JoAnn Edwards.

JoAnn's Oriental Seafood Salad

- ❖ 1/3 cup of slivered almonds
- *2 tablespoons of sesame oil
- ❖ 1 bag of bean sprouts (250g)
- ❖ 250g cooked prawns, shelled
- ❖ 500g seafood extender (pulled apart or sliced)
- 250g baby sliced mushrooms
- ❖ 6 green shallots, finely sliced

Dressing

- ❖ 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- ❖ 1 tablespoon sesame oil
- ♣ 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- *2 teaspoons light soy sauce
- ♣ 1 teaspoon sugar
- Combine Dressing items in a jar, shake well.
- Toast almonds on oven tray in moderate oven for about 5 minutes; cool.
- Toast sesame seeds by stirring over heat in heavy pan, remove from pan; cool.
- Combine the almonds, sesame seeds, bean sprouts, seafood extender, chopped prawns, mushrooms and shallots in bowl.
- Add dressing, toss well; refrigerate for 1 hour before serving.

What Rat Is That? Rats on St Huberts!!!

Let's acknowledge it - there are rats on St Huberts, but before we do something about "our resident rat", we need to identify it because of the six possibilities, four are "Aussie Goodies". Some residents just want them gone, others want to make sure they are not "innocent Australians".

Large rats found in and around houses are usually black rats, or less likely brown rats. Both these species are introduced to Australia. The native bush rats and swamp rats are generally very shy creatures that keep to densely vegetated areas with a thick shrub layer. The water rat is huge and sticks to water and the Antichinus is very small and shy.

It is extremely unlikely to find native rats in populated areas.

You can tell the difference between a black or brown rat, and a native bush or swamp rat by the length of the tail.

If the tail is as long as, or longer than, the body length (tip of the nose to base of the tail), it is a black or brown rat.

If the tail is shorter than the body length, it is one of our native rats.

Do not use fur colour to identify your rat as they can be highly variable.

The ability to swim also doesn't help identification.


Black rat (Rattus rattus)

The species originated in India and Southeast Asia and spread through the Near East in Roman times before reaching Europe by the 1st century and spreading with Europeans across the world. They have big thin ears and quite a round face. Their tail is sparsely haired and scaly.

Black rats are found in warmer regions, omnivores and not very specific in their food preferences. They are serious pests to farmers as they eat a wide range of agricultural crops.

Brown rat (Rattus norvegicus)

A colder region rat and thought to have originated in northern China, this rodent has now spread to all continents except Antarctica, and is the dominant rat in Europe and much of North America - making it possibly the most successful mammal on the planet alongside humans. With rare exceptions, the brown rat lives wherever humans live, particularly in urban areas. The brown rat is a true omnivore and will consume almost anything, but cereals form a substantial part of its diet. Interestingly the most-liked foods of brown rats include scrambled eggs, macaroni and cheese, raw carrots, and cooked corn kernels, the least-liked foods are raw beets, peaches, and raw celery.



Bush rat (Rattus fuscipes)

Is a small Australian strictly nocturnal rodent. It is an omnivore and one of the most common indigenous species of rats on the continent, found in many heathland areas of Victoria and NSW. Unlike the introduced rats, bush rats avoid humans where possible. Their ears are rounded.

Swamp rat (Rattus lutreolus)

Has a stocky build with black-brown fur and black feet, and it has small ears nearly concealed by hair. The tail is dark grey, scaly and sparsely haired.

Water Rat or Rakali (an indigenous name)

An unlikely visitor on the Island, they are very large, have a very thick tail, partially webbed hind legs, waterproof fur, a flattened head, a long blunt nose, many whiskers and small ears and eyes. Specialised for aquatics, the body is streamlined with a skull that is large, flat and elongated, with two molars on the upper and lower jaw. They are black to brown in colour with an orange to white belly, and dark tail with a white tip.

Antechinus

The 5th possible "rat" is more mouse-sized, small carnivorous marsupial (not a placental). They can be set apart from rodents such as rats and mice using -

- their front teeth.
 - Rodents have one pair of distinctive chisel shaped incisors that have hard yellow enamel on the front surfaces. Antechinuses have four rows of small sharp incisors.
- - Many antechinus species have large thin crinkly ears that have a notch in the margin, although not all will have this notch.
- - Antechinuses have a sparsely haired tail, which is the same length as the body or shorter (65-110mm).
- their habits.
 - Antechinuses are mainly nocturnal insect eaters, which are found in forest habitats and are not found often in urban areas. They shelter in spherical nests in hollow logs or crevices, but can sometimes found nesting in furniture in bush areas or farms.

Island Dine-Out 2017#3 @ Daleys Kitchen



inverted mascara and zig-zag lightening eyelashes, won the female prize of \$xxx (too valuable to mention here).



Fishing Around The Island Do The Right Thing When Fishing The Racks!

Keen anglers know that oyster leases are gun locations for key species such as bream, flathead and mulloway. While leases provide fantastic fishing opportunities, their key function is as aquaculture businesses providing fresh seafood for consumers.

In order to ensure access to these areas is maintained, DPI Fisheries is working with the aquaculture industry to ensure anglers do the right thing when fishing around oyster leases.

So far, this education campaign has involved social media posts and articles in key fishing magazines. However, a high quality video featuring stunning drone footage and underwater shots of feeding bream will soon be released. As well as featuring fantastic images, the video will present an easy-to-understand message about responsible fishing around oyster leases.





This messaging includes:

- ◆ Not damaging leases by tying up or running into lease infrastructure;
- ◆ Treating oyster farmers with respect and courtesy;
- ◆ Making no wake around leases areas;
- ◆ Not stealing oysters; and
- ◆ Maintaining water quality.

Keep an eye out for the "Responsible Fishing Around Oyster Leases" video on the DPI Fisheries Facebook page. It's a great clip blending an important message with fantastic fishing footage!

Fishing the racks - One of the key messages in the new oyster fishing video from DPI Fisheries is the importance of avoiding damage to oyster lease infrastructure.

Bream - All keen anglers know oyster leases are great places to fish. But you need to follow the rules!

"From CCC Capital Works projects information released in late June, we have discovered there are two more bus shelters planned for St Huberts in Helmsman Bvd. We know this from the CCC media release on 28 June 2017."

Then, in reply to an email sent to CCC from the Committee, we received the following from the "Coordinator Transport Operational Planning & Assets" on 17 November 2017 -

"I refer to your email regarding the new bus shelter to be installed near to the intersection of Helmsman Boulevard and Marina View Parade, St Huberts Island.

Council has also constructed DDA (Disability Discrimination Act) compliant bus stop concrete pads at existing bus stops adjacent to House No 91 (south bound before Marina View Parade) and opposite House No 91 (north bound after opposite of Marina View Parade) as a part of Council's DDA compliant Bus Stop Improvement Program to ensure safe access and boarding for disabled passengers on public transport.

I can confirm that Council does not have any current plans for a bus shelter or bus seat at the bus stops listed above."
