Bridge Safety Upgrade

Following the COVID restrictions I remained in contact with the appropriate personnel at the Central Coast Council and following the correspondence by me on 11th May 2021, I received a reply stating:

"Thanks for letting me know about your Annual General Meeting and the Quarterly Newsletter. I've prepared a response to your questions below and had the content endorsed by the funding body so it can be used in your Newsletter. FYI the same content is also about to be mailed to every community member who has provided feedback on this project.

Has there been any development on the design of the proposed safety barrier on the bridge?

Following the last phase of consultation, Council engaged a consultant to undertake a feasibility study to assess the various design options suggested by the community. This process was delayed by Council's financial situation, however we are now in receipt of the final report and are working through the viable options with our consultant to confirm whether they are realistic and affordable. Once these investigations are complete, further community consultation will be arranged to discuss the outcome and gain further feedback on the final recommended design.

Has there been a new timetable created in relation to the general work to be done on the bridge?

As a result of the additional consultation and design investigations, a new timetable has been developed which will see delivery of the safety barrier project in the next financial year. At this stage construction is now forecast to commence in early 2022."

Annual General Meeting

The Association's Annual General Meeting should have been held in March 2021 but due to the COVID restrictions it was postponed and is now to be held at the Cove Hall on Thursday 12th August 2021 commencing at 7:30 pm.

At the meeting all Committee members are required to stand down and their respective positions declared vacant.

Having regard to the COVID disruptions and the fact that the AGM should have been held in March 2021 and that the next AGM WILL BE HELD IN MARCH, 2022 - thus making a term of office of about 7 months, it is a good opportunity for newcomers to join the Association Committee.

Christmas in July

A "Christmas in July" dinner at Daleys Kitchen has been proposed for Friday 16th July 2021 and being planned and the date selected.

We have met with the new proprietors and discussions are ongoing in relation to the Menu and the Cost.

To find out anything about criminal activity on St Huberts you need to go to the Brisbane Water Police Facebook page at facebook.com/BrisbaneWaterPD. Buried in there, and after a lot of scrolling and searching through the page, you will find anything that happened on St Huberts.

Four days a week the Facebook page reports on property crime within the Brisbane Water police district.

The Facebook page of Central Coast Incident Alerts is also a VERY GOOD way to keep track of what is happening around the Coast - including Police Incidents. Check it out at facebook.com/ccincidentalerts.

From the Secretary

The last few months has seen correspondence on the following matters:

- Develop an agile approach to developing plans for the waterways with the community. As part of the first phase of consultation to inform the development of the CMP's they're running a survey which can be accessed through the Council website. Residents are encouraged to participate. Canal Maintenance - SHIRA still trying...

Email Correspondence to CCC from SHIRA Secretary 19 May 2021

"On behalf of our Association representing Island residents, we must again raise with Council our ongoing concerns of depletion of the sand to the beaches of the Canals, which leads to resident's seawalls becoming unstable. At any time, an inspection will show around 10 canal fronted properties where seawalls have dramatically moved, or fallen over, due to the sand being depleted or washed away from the front of the seawalls.

The canals are Council land, submerged Council land, they have a Deposited Plan number and even a street address. Council own them. To date there has been no Council maintenance of the Canals, and this is urgently required, particularly regarding depletion of Council sand in front of resident's seawalls, with the result that many walls have moved or fallen over.

The canals need to be maintained/dredged and the sands returned to the front of the seawalls. These sands have settled in the bottom of the canals. Just as Council fills potholes on the roads, the depletion of the sands to the front of residents properties needs urgent rectification. The canals are Council property and need to be maintained by Council – it is Council's responsibility.

Your email of 20 May 2020, said that scraping of dry sand on canal waterfront properties can be carried out by residents by hand to depths of no more than 300mm. But in most cases, there is no sand left to scrap back, it has moved, or is in the bottom of the canals.

Council advised that as at 25 January 2021, \$491,481.25 is in the St Huberts Island Jetty Levy Fund, which has been internally restricted by CCC resolution, and is protected. With the annual fee per pontoon being around \$800, then the fund should be increasing at about \$60,000 per year. This fund was intended to be for maintenance of the canals, which has never been done.

There is no reason for Council to delay this urgent work. The funds are available. Please consider this as a matter of urgency!"

St Huberts Island is a Heat Island

Making St Huberts Island Greener, GUST, Your Residents Association (SHIRA) and Trees

In mid-2019, Central Coast Council determined that most of the built-up parts of the Central Coast need more trees, shading and greening. They did a large satellite heat map study and chose the "hottest" 18 suburbs in the CCC area... and St Huberts Island was on the list.

This Draft "Greener Places Strategy" is designed to promote, maintain and enhance urban greening - best achieved by planting more trees on both public and private land. Urban Heat Islands occur when the urban environment replaces natural land cover with dense concentrations of pavement, buildings, roads and other surfaces that absorb and retain heat. This effect increases energy costs (e.g. air conditioning), air pollution levels, and heat-related illness and mortality. It is proven that there are far more significant benefits in greening our environment (St Huberts) compared to the few less-significant negatives. Well-positioned, shade-bearing trees are one of the most valuable assets a house or neighbourhood can have. Driven by strong NSW Government recommendations, Councils began reacting to the increasing Urban Heat Island effect, although the Central Coast local government is lagging behind others.



Which looks better, higher re-sale, cooler, more relaxing, healthier, reduces costs, happy chattering birds? You could have this too. SHIRA 'experts' can advise"

And so GUST was formed

"Disturbed by sweltering hot summers spent driving, parking and walking ourselves, our children, our grandchildren and our dogs around largely unshaded Peninsula streetscapes, we formed GUST (Grow Urban Shade Trees). Our aim was to address the gap in action and education around the enormous benefits of urban trees. GUST is a not-for-profit, volunteer organisation with no political affiliations. We formed with the support of the Umina Community Group and have completed a variety of local projects since forming in 2016."

How do you Green your House, Land and Nature Strip?

SHIRA has been in discussions with GUST who have suggested that Islanders take over the task of greening their part of the Island. Coincidentally we have an Islander, Des Mitchell on Nautilus, who is a member of The Everglades Lagoon Wetland Group, and also with links to GUST resources.

Des is keen to encourage, promote, guide, advise and sometimes source trees (via his contacts) for those of you on the Island who wish to engage in this *simple gardening exercise* leading to the most amazing benefits.

And Des has put his "tree where his mouth is" (!!). About 4 - 5 years ago he planted a Tuckeroo on the nature strip outside 8 Nautilus - check it out. GUST activities over the past years have shown that Council are encouraging these types of GUST-guided plantings. There are so many small, medium and large trees very suited to the St Huberts environment (see the link at the end to possible suitable trees).

To get you moving in the right direction...

So, if you feel the need to do some "greening" at your property, there are so many beautiful and safe native tree choices available. Observe the sun's path at your place and chat to Des or your local nursery. GUST have created an illustrated list of council-preferred tree suggestions. As we plunge into the cold, dark depths of Winter ...

It is a given that a butcher's recipe for ANY meat dish WILL BE A BIG HIT with the family.

Ron's Pea & Ham Soup

Ingredients:

- 2 packets soup mix (peas, barley etc)
- 1 smoked ham hock (cut in 2)
- A few smoked bacon bones
- 1 sweet potato
- ♦ 1 large leek
- 2 large potatoes

Method:

- Soak the soup mix in a large bowl of water (over night). You will have to top up the water as they soak it up.
- Cover the hock and bones in a large boiler with water and diced onion and slow boil for 1½ hours so meat will easily come off the bones, then put bones and meat in a dish to cool, leaving all the water in the boiler.
- Remove all the meat from the bones and hock, and chop it up finely leaving out any fat etc. Only use the lean meat.

Also finely chop up any of the pork rind if you wish.

Return all the meat etc to the boiler.

 Using a course grater, grate the potatoes and sweet potato into another large bowl and finely chop the leek, leaving out the hard outer leaves.

Place all the chopped veggies into the boiler with the meat and water.

- Add all the soup mix soaking in the water together with left over water and stir the boiler.
- You may need to add additional water depending on how thick you want the soup.

Bring to the boil and then reduce to a low boil for 2-3 hours stirring frequently from the bottom with a flat wooden stirrer. Be careful not to let it burn on the bottom. If you don't pre-soak the soup mix it will stick and burn on the bottom of the boiler.

I never measure anything... change to suit yourself.

Antechinus

JUNE 2021

It has been reported that there are Antechinus on the Island

This is a small, Australian, protected, rarely-seen, carnivorous marsupial AND ...

It is often mistaken for a rat/ mouse

There are rats on the Island - possibly black, brown, bush or swamp - and we try to bait or capture them.

BUT... Don't bait for Antechinus or kill them - they are "Aussie Goodies"

They can be set apart from rodents such as rats and mice using:

• Their front teeth. Rodents have one pair of distinctive chisel shaped incisors that have hard yellow enamel on the front surfaces. Antechinuses have four rows of small sharp incisors.

• Their ears.

Many antechinus species have large thin crinkly ears that have a notch in the margin, although not all will have this notch.

- Their tail. Antechinuses have a sparsely haired tail, which is the same length as the body or shorter (65-110mm).
- Their habits.

Antechinuses are mainly nocturnal insect eaters, which are found in forest habitats and are not found often in urban areas. They shelter in spherical nests in hollow logs or crevices, but can sometimes be found nesting in furniture in bush areas or farms.

Council's "Our Coast, Our Waterways" campaign

If you REALLY want to have a voice in how our Brisbane Water waterway is managed and used, it's health, community access and recreation, and provide your views, then read on.,

Under a NSW Act, Council is legislatively required to develop Coastal Management Programs and are in the early stages of this process.

They admit they are currently struggling to motivate the Central Coast community, and are desperate (and sad!) to get their plans for these programs right and gain the community's trust.

They have recently launched their "Our Coast, Our Waterways" campaign to rectify community lack of interest, and our awareness of what they have already achieved.

There is a (huge) heap of information on all this at <u>yourvoiceourcoast.com/waterways</u> that you will need time to sift through. In the meantime, the first phase of consultation is a 15 minute survey at https://

Shade Trees at the Bottom of the Bridge

SHIRA has recently approached CCC with the request to plant two shade trees at the bottom of the bridge, near the park seats. The six palms planted there have not upheld their end of the bargain, and the entry to the Island is looking very sparse. Carefully chosen trees here would need to be able to shade, handle salt laden winds, the sandy soil, high vehicles and no branch-dropping. SHIRA is working with Parks and Reserves, but they say not to expect anything soon.

Long-time Island resident, St Huberts Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator and (more importantly) serial "Fishing Bragger" Martin Wellington has gone into voluntary retirement.

After being increasingly unsteady on his pins, several months ago he had a fall on a boat ramp and broke a rib.

Sale of Solstice Park

Several Facebook posts in early May caused a major concern for (probably) all Islanders. A table originating from CCC "sort of" indicated that Solstice Place (Park?), and many other 'pocket parks', were up for sale. When CCC was asked:

A just added Facebook post shows an "interesting" table of assets to be sold-off. This table includes the green space at Solstice Place/Solstice Point on St Huberts Island, and is for sale for \$3,000. My question is: Is the green space at Solstice Place on St Huberts Island on, or will be on, the list of assets Central Coast Council is selling-off? They replied:

There are no land parcels identified in the Tranche 3 Asset Sales Program in St Huberts Island.

The table was originally posted on the "Central Coast Acf Branch" Facebook page for the purpose of protesting the current CCC sale of the "Austin Butler Access" behind the Courthouse at Woy Woy. Research showed the table was very old - from either a 2009 or 2016 intention of Gosford City Council to sell off assets - including Solstice Park.

Interesting that CCC's answer only indicated that Solstice was not part of the current Tranche 3 of asset sales - might it still appear later. THIS MUST NOT HAPPEN!

🌤 Seaweed in Canals

Many canal residents are again becoming concerned by other

residents pushing seaweed back into the canals.

The removal of sea grass (wrack) and debris from foreshore areas of the Island has been a continuing problem for all water-front residents. This is particularly so for residents in the canal corners where the accumulation occurs after other non-corner residents persist in returning the wrack to the canal from where it came. The wind and tide do the rest.

DON'T BE A TOSSER Residents are encouraged to collect the wrack/debris and put it in the green waste bin for collection on the normal day. If there is an excess then use large garbage bags filled to a manageable size and placed at the kerbside for collection by Council. Phone CCC on1300 463 954 to request a collection, or do it online at <u>centralcoastcouncil.custhelp.com</u>, providing your address and how many bags for pickup.
