FROM THE SECRETARY

Following a request from Committee Member – Helene Cornwell, the obelisk in Long Arm Parade has been cleaned by Council, so I thought it timely for some newer residents to enjoy some history.

FROM A NEWSPAPER ARTICLE IN THE GOSFORD AND PENINSULAR TIMES – TUESDAY 11TH MARCH 1986

While patriotism may be lagging in some parts of Australia, the 400 residents of St Huberts Island don't intend to let the 1988 Bicentenary pass without due respect. Members of the St Huberts Island Residents' Association plan to erect a cairn on the island to honour the fact that it is believed to have been the first port of call by whites in the days of colonisation.

In fact, according to Mrs Trish Schoer, an official of the association, the visitors were none less that Captain Arthur Phillip, Lieutenant Hunter, captain of the "Sirius", officers in a long boat, sailors and a party of marines who spent a night on St Huberts. It was an exploration trip to find good farm land and the party set off from Sydney with a week's food supplies. As evening closed, they sailed around the South Head and at 9pm they moored the boats in a cove on "the north west side of the bay". They spent the first night on board the boats.

The following morning, Mrs Schoer said, they sailed north and entered a narrow channel and crossed The Rip. They veered right in an open channel and stopped on the bank of a sandy island. It had rained hard during the day and in the afternoon they dried their clothes and tents, caught a crab and ate it. The party spent the night on the island, suspected to be St Huberts but it will never be known whether it was St Huberts or Rileys Island.

"Hunter who made a map, published in London in 1792, does not show any channel separating the two islands." Mrs Schoer said. The title deeds of the first land grants suggest a mud flat to be the boundary between them.

"The next morning, they continued their exploration southward and left Brisbane Water."

To celebrate the bicentenary of this visit it has been decided to erect a cairn with a bronze plaque on St Huberts Island.

"A spoon has been produced to raise funds for this project. The design of the spoon depicts a Latin cross between the antlers of a stag. This represents the vision said to have been experienced by St Hubert on Good Friday 653AD as he hunted in a part of France which is now Belgium."

Extensive research has been completed on the history of St Huberts Island from 1788 till today and a book was published for the Bicentenary. The latest revised edition can be ordered through the website as listed on page 3.

Further canal tours were organised with Council staff and on 15th May a representative from Australian Environmental Services also inspected the canals. All the different situations that require scraping or dredging back to the seawalls, as well as some dredging at a couple of inlets, were identified. This will provide information to plan some trial work which will then be used to prepare a scope of work for a contract to undergo the much-needed maintenance of our canals. You will be kept informed of the progress.

Also, a further email has been sent to Council regarding the amended clause relating to pontoon inspections which needs to be redrafted and re-issued. Until such time as this has been provided, your Committee suggests you should wait to sign your Deed of Licence.


