After mowing the lawns, please do not blow the debris into the canals and pass on this request to any tradesmen you hire. Also, please keep your kerbs and gutters clean. All the debris from the gutters finds its way into the canals through the drainage system. Over time, this has caused the drains to become blocked with solidified detritus which has proven difficult to remove.

The cleaning of the kerbs by the Council is hampered by the number of parked cars/boats on the roadways which has reduced not only the effectiveness of this service, but also the number of times it is provided. Therefore, it is up to us as residents to all play a part in keeping our island clean and tidy.

It is also timely to remind dog owners to collect their pets' droppings and dispose of them into the garbage. Anything else is a health hazard.

AROUND THE CANALS

Help Look After Our Island Canal System

- 1. The Council is currently clearing out the areas from the front of the storm water outlets in the canals. The build-up of the siltation of the outlets has occurred over 55 years since the island was developed from the run off of the street gutters. We will get the Council street sweeper to come on a more regular basis, but because of the caravans, boats and cars permanently parked on the streets the sweeper can only remove 50% of the debris in the gutter. If residents can regularly remove the leaves etc from in front of their property it would elevate a lot of the canal pollution.
- 2. We are always going to have seagrass washing up onto our waterfronts and which most residents rake up and put in their green bins, on their gardens or bagged for council to pick up. However, some waterfront owners simply pile the seagrass up and push it back into the water on the outgoing tide. Most of this seagrass sinks with the weight, further polluting our canal system.

If Council is prepared to help us, we should be considerate enough to assist and consider our neighbours living in our canals.
