Island Bridge Safety Upgrade

I have been in contract with the Central Coast Council as to whether a decision has been made relative to the design of the proposed Island Bridge Safety Upgrade. (The Council had previously circulated 3 mesh Options for consideration).

I had hoped to be able advise which option had been selected, if a Contractor had been engaged, when was such project likely to start etc, in this Newsletter, but such reply has not yet been received although I understand a decision has been made by Council.

Length of Moored Boats in the Canals

Council has also recently replied to the SHIRA enquiry of reviewing the maximum length of boats that can be moored in the Canals. Council replied that length of vessels shall not exceed ten (10) metres or the waterfrontage of the property, whichever is the lesser. There development criteria recognise that the canals are shallow, confined waterways and the maximum boat length of 10m will avoid any problems with navigation and manoeuvring within the canals and visual amenity.

Should someone wish to apply for a variation to the criteria via DCP, they would need to demonstrate that the objectives outlined above could still be met. A development application would be assessed on its merits by Councils Development Assessment Unit and Council is not in a position to say what likelihood of success an application might have. Larger boats should be considered on a case-by-case basis through the development assessment process, via application by the Resident/Boat owner.

Neighbour Disputes



In the last few months, SHIRA has been asked for advice on some neighbour issues, these have mainly been related to canal waterfront access. So, we offer these general notes for resident's assistance.

- Luckily most of the canal blocks on the island are rectangular with mostly between 18 to 20m canal frontage, so the canal waterfront boat mooring use is mostly established by the projection of the boundary lines and the maximum length of moored boat Council allows (currently 10m but may review by Council). Although the beaches are on Council land and can be used by all. Similarly, we don't own the water which can be used by all.
- Most of the issues are at the ends and corners of the canals, where a lot of blocks only have about a 3m wide canal frontage, and up to 6 blocks can be contesting sufficient waterfront access due to their block shape and overlapping of boundary projection sight lines. Sand silt up in some of these canal ends can increase the difficulty of launching a boat from a normal boat ramp, so launching of boats can overlap other's ramps. Also, the installation of pontoons, mooring poles, boat cradle rail tracks, etc are potentially contentious issues. The simple answer is "what has Council approved in their DA approval".

The SHIRA objectives are to watch over and protect the interests of the residents of St Huberts Island and to do all such things as may be conducive to the wellbeing of the residents of St Huberts Island. But this doesn't include refereeing neighbour disputes where both sides have dug in their heels.

SHIRA plays with a straight bat in such matters and does not take either side – but refers the residents to the Council who own and manage the canals and to Maritime who control safe boating on the waters of the Canals. I have been advised that Maritime have threatened to remove and impound boats that restrict other persons use of the waterways, eg by restricting other's free ramp access. Council and Maritime are the regulating statutory authorities, and so the final referees.

ISLAND LOCAL WINS DESIGN AWARD



A St Hubert's Island resident has received national recognition for her work in designing Woy Woy Fishermen's Wharf after she was tasked with revitalising the iconic restaurant.

The designer of the project, Louise Williams, received an award for Best Commercial Design at the Australian Building Designers Award on Friday, October 22.

Louise, along with her business LAW Building Design, worked on the Wharf in 2017 in partnership with building company, Parkwood Pre-Fabricated Homes, and interior decorator, Xanthe Highland.

She was tasked with modernising and expanding the existing restaurant over the water with overhanging decks and caves. "This was a one-of-a-kind project because you don't often get the chance to build on top of the water," Louise said.

New trees at Island Entrance

We are fortunate that some interested Island residents have planted new Tuckeroo trees at our Island Entrance at the start of the bridge, with 6 new trees planted on each side of the road.

These Tuckeroos are a very hardy tree able to adapt to difficult sites, such as poor soils and salt wind exposure. The Tuckeroo has leathery leaves with small yellow or greenish flower clusters on the branch ends. They are excellent for street planting. When mature they will be about 8 metres high by 6 metres wide.


A juvenile Tuckeroo can be seen at the front of 8 Nautilus, and two 40 year old mature Tuckeroos are at the front of 5 Mainsail.

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
